The Baltimore Curriculum Project (BCP) is a nonprofit that operates a network of neighborhood charter schools in East Baltimore: City Springs Elementary/Middle School, Hampstead Hill Academy and Wolfe Street Academy.

Neighborhood Charter Schools

BCP educates all children in the neighborhood. Any child living in or moving into a BCP school neighborhood may enroll at any time of the year, at any grade level, without applying through a lottery.

BCP schools provide a liberal arts education that builds a solid foundation for high school, college, and career. Teachers receive the best researchbased educational tools available and the training to use them most effectively.

	was likely recruited with the help of Jon McGill, BCP's Director of Academic Affairs.
	The day begins with a rousing assembly to energize Mary for the day ahead.
8:00am	After Mary returns to class, she participates in a Restorative Circle where
	students take turns answering a question posed by their teacher, Mrs. Jones. As they
	share "one exciting thing that happened over the weekend" or "who is their hero and
	why", they are strengthening their relationships with Mrs. Jones and one another.
	Restorative Circles are part of Restorative Practices, an approach to con-
	flict resolution and school culture that emphasizes positive relationships over punish-
	ment. We implemented Restorative Practices in our schools in 2007 with support
	from OSI-Baltimore and the Goldsmith Family Foundation. The effect on behavior
	and school culture has been dramatic.
8:15am	Mary's first class is reading and language arts. Her teacher, Mrs. Jones,
	uses the Direct Instruction curriculum, a research-based program, BCP brought DI
	to City Schools in 1996. DI has been used effectively to teach students from all back-
	grounds for over 40 years. All Mary knows is that she and her classmates are en-
	gaged and excited about learning.
	Mary's classroom is orderly and she understands what is expected of her.
	Mrs. Jones uses a classroom management curriculum called CHAMPS, which helps
	her set clear expectations for her students and creates a classroom environment
	conducive to learning. She learned to use CHAMPS during a week-long summer
	training provided by BCP and she is glad to have this tool in her toolbox.
	Mrs. Jones is a first year teacher. Today, BCP Academic Coach Brenda
	Kahn is observing her class. After school Brenda will provide Mrs. Jones with written
	feedback and discuss strategies for improving instruction and classroom man-
	agement. Mrs. Jones is extremely grateful for the training, curriculum, and coaching
	support she receives from BCP Academic Coaches like Brenda, Marvelyn Johnson,
