Alison Perkins-Cohen

Chief of Staff, Baltimore City Public Schools

Currently in her tenth year as Chief of Staff of Baltimore City Public Schools, Alison Perkins-Cohen serves as second in command to CEO Sonja Santelises, managing day-to-day strategic priorities and decision-making in finance, communications, facilities management, personnel, emergency management, school operations, transportation and government relations.

Prior to her role as COS, Alison was the Executive Director of the Office of New Initiatives for five years, overseeing implementation of City Schools' portfolio management strategy. In that role she developed the district's 10-year plan for the creation of 21st century facilities for all students.

Prior to coming to City Schools, Alison worked extensively in Washington DC, including working for the Senate Appropriations Committee and at the Office of Management and Budget. Alison also served as Executive Director of the Baltimore Curriculum Project for six years, securing significant gains in achievement and enrolment for five charter conversion schools.

Alison earned a Bachelor of Arts degree from the University of Massachusetts and a Masters in Public Policy from the Claremont Graduate University. She lives in Baltimore with her husband and two sons, both graduates of Baltimore City Public Schools.

Roger Schulman is President and CEO of the Fund for Educational Excellence, Baltimore's only education fund. His career in education began more than 30 years ago as a Teach for America teacher in Baltimore City Public Schools—an experience that sparked a lifelong commitment to the city.

After working with The New Teacher Project, Roger joined the Fund in 2010, where he led a strategic realignment focused on expanding resources for schools, accelerating effective solutions, and celebrating success. Under his leadership, the Fund has grown significantly, securing tens of millions in philanthropic investments, awarding more than 225 grants to City Schools principals, and elevating Baltimore education through data-driven reports and leadership recognition.

Dr. Irma E. Johnson has brought over 45 years of expertise in educational leadership, professional development, curriculum mapping, teacher development, and instructional strategic planning. She currently serves as an Assistant Professor of Educational Leadership at Coppin State University, where she prepares future school leaders for success.

Prior to joining Coppin State University, Dr. Johnson dedicated more than four decades to the Baltimore City Public Schools System, serving as a teacher, department head, assistant principal, principal, and executive director for K–8 schools. Throughout her tenure, she led initiatives in program development, improved instructional practices, supported urban school leadership development, and advocated for resources to strengthen public education.

Dr. Johnson specializes in coaching novice principals to establish effective systems and structures, solve problems, and make data-driven decisions. After a distinguished career in P–12 education, she continues to mentor new school leaders to achieve excellence in administration. Additionally, she has served as an Adjunct Professor at the Johns Hopkins School of Education, teaching courses in educational leadership and advanced instructional strategies.

As a member of the Maryland State Board of Education, Dr. Johnson contributes her expertise to several committees, including the Education Policy Committee and the Early Childhood Committee, where she collaborates on policies that advance student success and support leadership and teacher development statewide.

From Baltimore to Annapolis: City Schools' 2026 Legislative Priorities

This session will provide an in-depth look at Baltimore City Public Schools' 2026 legislative priorities, with a focus on preserving sustainable state funding and resources under the Blueprint for Maryland's Future amidst ongoing federal uncertainty. Participants will explore key priorities such as ensuring accurate methodologies for counting poverty, as well as the need for critical capital investments in the face of a looming state budget deficit. The discussion will highlight ways for educators to enhance the district's advocacy efforts.

School Funding under the Blueprint for Maryland's Future

The Blueprint for Maryland's Future fundamentally changed how schools in Maryland are funded, bringing an equity lens to how funds flow from the state to districts and from districts to schools. The session will discuss how the funding structures under the Blueprint work and what this means for schools and classrooms in City Schools.

Schools Have Evolved: So Must School Culture

Over the past 30 years, public education has grown more complex—making strong academic systems necessary, but no longer sufficient. This interactive session explores how and why school culture has become a critical driver of student and staff success. Participants will reflect on shifts in education, examine current culture challenges within their own schools, and learn how systems such as Leader in Me, Culturally Responsive Teaching and the House System work together as modern, aligned frameworks for building belonging, leadership, and engagement. Attendees will leave with one concrete action step to strengthen culture in their school community.
